Dear Trinity Family,

Ann and I enjoyed a wonderful weekend in Lexington, Virginia where I officiated a wedding for a young woman whom we have known since she was a baby. The scenery was astounding! The woods were blossoming with redbuds and white dogwoods. Front yards boasted red and pink and purple tulips, bright yellow daffodils and forsythia, wild violets, grape hyacinths, and pink dogwoods. We also enjoyed the treat of frozen sunshine – light snow flurries with blue skies overhead.

On Sunday, we visited our host's church. Aware that there had been a parish meeting between the services, still, Ann and I were shocked by the sheer volume in the sanctuary – boisterous conversations going on throughout the room. Sounded like a family reunion! Even after the prelude began to play, the ladies in front of us continued to talk for several minutes, paying little mind to our presence. "Well I don't see why we need a new organ. It's going to cost a million dollars!" "The one we have sounds just fine!" "And...."

The need for a new organ was just one of the issues discussed at the parish meeting that morning. The much more pressing issue, given the current political/social climate, was whether the church should change its name in order to be more inclusive and inviting. Even in Lexington, Virginia, the heart of Dixie, today's deeply divided social and cultural issues are having an impact.

In the midst of our nation's civil unrest stands the Episcopal Church, struggling mightily to provide a safe place for heartfelt discussion and reconciliation. Rooted in the deep traditions of Anglican prayer and worship, and trusting the authority God's revelation through the healthy balance of scripture, tradition and reason that guide our daily pilgrimage, Episcopalians go forth boldly, bearing the love of God to the forlorn of this world.

In the midst of the current crisis that raises doubt and hatred in every corner, let us keep our focus on the empty cross and our risen Lord, who is the source of hope in every trouble. May Christ fill our hearts with the power and joy of his resurrection.
