A Word from Father Tony

November 1, 2017 marked the 500th anniversary of the beginning of the Reformation. Martin Luther's nailing of the Ninety-five Theses to the Castle Church door opened the floodgates of Reformation thought. Among

the many Reformation theologians, two that stand out are French theologian John Calvin, (1509-1554) and Dutch theologian Jacobus Arminius, (1560-1609). Their writings and followers profoundly shaped Christianity as we know it today.

Just to give this an English Reformation perspective, the first Book of Common Prayer was published in 1559. Jamestown, Virginia, was established in 1607 and the King James Bible was published in 1611. The Puritans landed at Plymouth Rock in 1620. The 16th and 17th Centuries were exciting times. The Reformers set the stage for the Age of Enlightenment (also known as the Age of Reason), which began as early as 1650.

GotAnswers.Com describes Calvinism and Arminianism as "two systems of theology that attempt to explain the relationship between God's sovereignty and man's responsibility in the matter of salvation." God's sovereignty and man's responsibility...sounds simple enough!

At the Fall Clergy Conference, table discussion at dinner turned to the Five Points of Calvinism, known by its acronym, TULIP: Total Depravity, Unconditional Election, Limited Atonement, Irresistible Grace, and Perseverance of the Saints.

Each of these points would take pages to explain, however, suffice it to say, Calvinists believe that with the fall of Adam and Eve in the Garden and the birth of original sin, humankind, human nature, is totally depraved - absolutely corrupted by sin and totally unable to respond to God on our own.

Jacobus Arminius believed in a "prevenient" grace, a preceding grace, an enabling grace that in spite of our sinful nature, makes it possible for us to believe and respond to God's love. Yes, we are sinners, yes we are sinful, yet by the Holy Spirit we can make right choices, we can respond to God's incredible grace and love.

Confusing? Perhaps, however, there are some great quizzes online to help you figure out what you believe and shed light on the differences in the two theologies. Here are the questions asked by one: "Are You a Calvinist, Arminian, Or Neither?" found at *http://www.socialappbuilder.com/gfba2/a/9918/3/*

- Do you believe man is capable of "choosing" to repent and believe on Christ?
- Do you believe repentance and faith are "conditions" required for salvation?
- Do you believe Jesus died on the cross for the sins of the world (every human being who ever has been, is, and will be)?
- Do you believe that when God convicts someone to repent and be saved, they can resist that?
- Do you believe that once an individual is truly converted that they can ever become "unsaved" again?
- Does God send certain individuals to hell or do they send themselves?
- Are some babies going to heaven and some going to hell based upon God's election?
- Will a person who is saved without a doubt show it by their changed life?
- I chose to take this test on my own. [Yes, this question has a purpose in determining your bent.]

The answers provided are not simply "Yes" or "No." There are multiple choices to choose from that help you identify your beliefs, and the result may surprise you.

How does it affect us today? I believe it is important for each of us to know our personal theology concerning how people come to know the Lord. It helps each of us in telling your own story, our witness to God's power in our lives, and presenting the hope of the Gospel to others.

It also shows us how the Reformation has touched our lives, how deeply embedded we find the teachings of the great theologians. We also gain a new appreciation for the 1st Century theologians: Matthew, Mark, Luke, John, and Paul, who passed on the teachings and words of Christ and the teachings and understanding of the early church. The Reformers **remind us that God's power and** grace are revealed anew as we struggle to understand God's revelation in the midst of our own generation.

The Reformers remind us that God is working in every generation, equipping the saints with power and grace and new understanding to spread the Good News of His mighty love and passion for each of us.
