Dear Trinity Family,

My special thanks to all of you who put on the marvelous Lenten luncheon Wednesday. The Parish Hall looked great, the flowers were exquisite, and lunch was terrific. Thank you again for making this happen. (Editor's note: Thanks also to Fr. Tony who provided the wonderful sing along and music.)

Trinity's budget is pretty tight this year and keeping up with the bills has proved a challenge at times. One way all of us can help is simply keeping up with our pledges, which helps take the burden off George and Figg, and with keeping our budget in the black. I think we all can relate.

This past week and a half, I've had the experience of fulfilling a new role as caregiver for my wife, who is recovering from knee surgery. Hats off to all of you who have served or are serving as caregivers - not just for those who have served for a week or two, but especially for those who have been faithful servants for months or even years. You are my heroes!

It's a learning curve to learn the difference between *caretaker* and *caregiver*. There are many of you who I have talked to and observed in our congregation who are *caregivers*. And we are blessed to also have *caretakers* here at Trinity. It seems a *caretaker* can consist of someone who is hired or a neighbor who is helping out, or even someone from a hospital's home health care. They are caring people who have compassion and concern for others. They give their time, on a usually short term basis, and have a "window" into the needs of the one being cared for.

A *caregiver* is one who gives out of unconditional love for another. This doesn't mean that there are no small trials involved, but that the love far outweighs those trials. There is no "window", the caregiver is right in the middle of the room seeing all the difficulties the loved one is going through, knowing the background that may cause them to behave in a certain way, their special likes and dislikes, and caring on a deep level for those needs.

I haven't been doing it for long, but I can imagine the immense stress that this puts on the loving caregiver in the long term, and
